Expectations of us, from both old and new members will increase, which includes, as stated in our first paragraph, to defend common interests, create activities and more. We promise that we shall do our best!



Skogshyddan gave us a whole family



In the early 1970s I came with my parents for the first time to Kristdala. We spent some fine summer days in a house in the woods, "according to me that grew up in a suburb of Stockholm. I understood much later that it was the home of my grandmother's parents. The house was called Skogshyddan, which I thought was a proper name. Now, in 2009, me and my partner, Marie are about to buy this great house!

In the Spring of 2008 my mother came to visit. Over a cup of coffee the subject turns to Skogsyddan, a few memories appear and then the discussion is in full swing. Marie and I had long been looking in the northern part of Sweden for a summer house, but nevertheless we decided to make a trip down to Kristdala, after some persuasion from my mother. We went down to watch, but didn't expect to buy a house deep in the dark forests of Småland. However, our perspective of Småland changed as we drove down through Ankarsrum, Hjorted and Ishult. We began to see broadleaves and a lot of lakes. Småland is perhaps not so dark after all!

When we arrive, we see a house that need love and care. Despite this, we felt great warmth for both house and landscape. After some time in the house with cleaning and things, neighbors start coming by, saying hello. They all have stories to tell about the house and the people who lived here.

At this moment my curiosity is awakened and I feel I want to find out more about my family in Småland. I impressive building originally served didn't expect my family to be big.

Kristdala is a small community and when people do not recognize us they curiously ask us where we come from. When we tell them that we are from only guess. 
Jöns and Brita's family history.

My father left a book behind, which begins with the words "Jöns Mårtensson, reeve of Julita 1582 - 1587".

With this phrase as a guide my husband and I drove from Finland to Julita castle, by the lake Öljaren in Sweden in 1995. We exited from the highway, and drove on a small road in the middle of a dense forest. Finally a rich landscape opened up before our eyes with and in front of us there was a threestorey stone castle, old and beautiful, with wings. Above the castle huge oak trees had been cut leaving stumps large enough to serve as tables. Had they perhaps been tiny young trees when Jöns Mårtensson, served here under Gustav Vasa's youngest son Karl? The as a monastery since the beginning of the 1180's. I tried to understand why Duke Karl of Södermanland, who in Finland was known as a very strict and stingy man, wanted to pay for the wedding costs for Jöns and his bride. Perhaps the Duke was pleased with Jöns work, and perhaps also pleased for the choice of bride. Brita's father, pastor Laurentius Andreae, or Lars Andersson, had In December 2008 we visited the for many years served in Karl's own church, Allhelgonakyrkan, and as vicar in Nyköping. Lars Andersson and his family were much trusted by Karl.

> Apparently Brita proved to be a knowledgeable and energetic young woman, because already the following year 1588 she became responsible for the kitchen staff and their work at Nyköping Castle. Brita Larsdotter now became foreman, in charge of a bunch of keys, with the main responsibility of the castle everyday household. On Gustav Vasa's orders the castle started to keep records. Textiles had to be stored in enough quantities for what was needed at the castle, and if there was not enough in the castle's repository, additional quantities were ordered from the Duke's other castles.



In the archives there is a letter from 1614 which was sent to Jöns, where Queen Kristina orders Jöns to send as much linen there is at Vibyholm castle, and mentions that there should be 500 alnar (aln is an old Swedish unit of length equal to about two feet. translator's note)

The letter reads:

To our servant and reeve at Wibyholm manor Jöns Mårtensson.

Receive our favour. Christina, ruler by God, Queen of Sweden, Giöthe, Wende Finland, Karelia, Lapland, Caijan and Estonia likewise Duchess of Holstein Gottorp.

It is our will and command, Jöns Månsson, that you shall send us all the linen which you have there in store at Wibyholm. And that I have been told amounts to five hundred alnar.

We order you to see to that this is here in (missing text) latest (missing text)

Nyköping July 13, year of 1614 Christina RS

First Jöns Mårtensson and Brita lived on the Nyköping castle premises, where their eldest son Carl Jönsson was born in 1590, probably, he was named for the Duke.

The friendship between Queen Kristina and Jöns Mårtensson's family again proved useful. The queen, who enjoyed arranging marriages among her friends and acquaintances, used her talents as matchmaker for Carl Jönsson. In 1616 he married Magdalena Strang daughter of Hans Strang officer in the cavalierly. The Strang family was wealthy and came originally from Scotland. Strang had lent money to the king Johan III. As pledge he had received several farms in Kristdala and other places in Småland. The pledge was never resolved but remained with the Sabelskiöld family. The most significant farm was Bråhult in Kristdala. The couple did have two daughters before Magdalena suddenly died in October 1628. Later, in 1634, Carl Jönsson married again, now to Ingeborg Rosenstråle, belonging to an old Swedish noble family.

Duke Karl, later King Charles IX, died in 1611, but his son Gustav II Adolf, was not crowned king until August 1617. However, already as a young man Gustav performed the duties expected of a king and eagerly took part in war preparations.

These preparations were also attended by Carl Jönsson who now decided to start his military career.

In 1616 Carl Jönsson had reached the rank of second lieutenant and was then in the year of 1617, in connection with Gustav II Adolf's coronation, knighted with the name Sabelskjöld.

Why was he knighted? There have been many speculations, such as Carl, in a critical battle situation, should have provided the king with his own horse, or perhaps escaped on horseback together with the king. One version says that Carl, with his shield and sabre, defended the king when the enemy with bayonets tried to throw him out of the saddle. More likely the knighthood was a reward to the family for serving the Duke and his son for two generations. The Sabelskjöld Coat of Arms can still be seen on the wall of the great hall in the House of Nobility in Stockholm, numbered as number 150.

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Greetings from a former President

With these lines I want to send a warm greeting to all known and unknown in our fine family. During the years 1986 to 1995 I had the pleasure to be member of the Board, and during five years as the president. We were a good working team which implemented a number of decisions.

One recurring issue was the so-called "name theft", where a person took the name Sabelskjöld with the permission of PRV (Swedish Patent Authorithy who regulates name issues, translators remark). Our response was strong, because the family association should have been consulted by the PRV. We hired a lawyer Bo Adrianzon and Judge of Appeal Claes Uggla, Stockholm, but despite extensive investigation, the chances to repeal the "name theft" were small. Yet, the annual meeting in Norrköping

in 1995 took the decision to continue investigation. That was when I left the board, I felt that my time and effort was not enough to continue the fight on the name issue. More resent efforts have turned out to be without success, so our association will have to work on other tasks.

My interest for the family has been strong ever since the first family meeting in Kristdala 1955, when I, among others, got to know our pioneers Carl Rutegård, Valter Jansson and Herbert Bredammar. Prior to our big family meeting in Blackstad in 1964 Carl and I had many contacts. I preached in the church and Carl was the excellent host at the big dinner in Flen.

Now we have a new board with Rolf Svensson as chairman. Many of us are happy with the Board's work. Good luck, from a previous president. Our forefather's life and work is well worth remembering.

How many Sabelskjold descendants are there?

Släktföreningen Sabelskjold has about 400 members. This is only a small part of all descendants of Karl Jönsson Sabelskjold. On the association's CD there are over twenty thousand, but even that is just a small part of the family.

It is of course impossible to come to a precise number of Sabelskjold descendants, but one can through simple mathematics show that the number is large.

Today we have 14-15 generations between us and Karl Jönsson Sabelsk-jold. During the first three centuries families were big. One can recall that Karl Jönsson Sabelskjold had eight children, his son Jöns had seven, and his son Carl had six daughters.

Assuming four children per family, which is probably low counts, the number of descendants grow by a factor of four for each generation. After a generation we have 4 descendants, after two generations 16, after three 64 and so on. After 14 generations, we will reach the amazing figure of more than 200 millions!

Now we are in reality not so many, when the number of descendants grows, we begin to marry between Sabelskjöldare. Then we have people with double or multiple familybonds.
